Call to Order and Roll Call

The meeting was called to order by Chair Davenport at 7:00 p.m. and a quorum was established. A sign-in sheet was distributed. A Zoom meeting was launched. Those in attendance were:

Approval of Minutes – May 20, 2025

Program/Department Reports

A. ASAC / Coalition Update (Julie Furne)

• Personnel: Julie announced her resignation effective July 28, 2025. She thanked the Board for its support. Julie accepted a position with MercyOne/Genesis as Disaster Preparedness Coordinator for Region 5 (16 counties).

Board comment: Members thanked Julie for her service and county impact.

B. Public Health – Communicable Disease & Programs (Jen Warren)

- FY Closeout / Foot Clinics: FY ended with funds fully utilized. Foot care clinics will continue next year; currently 70 clients served with a >1-year waiting list (service maintained only if 6-week cadence can be met).
- Measles Update (Eastern Iowa):
 - Case: Monmouth resident; older adult, fully vaccinated (two MMR doses);
 modified measles presentation (fever/rash; less typical symptoms).
 - Exposures: ~12 public locations identified; ~425 potential contacts being notified and monitored.
 - o Follow-up Protocols:
 - Vaccinated contacts: weekly check-ins for 21 days.
 - Unvaccinated: IGG prophylaxis within 6 days of exposure available; isolation periods 21–28 days depending on IGG.
 - o Zero-Dose Guidance: Children who already received their first MMR at 12 months may receive an additional "zero-dose" ≥28 days later (does not

- replace the routine 4–6 year dose); VFC covers cost. Vaccine and IGG supplies are in good shape.
- PPE/Fit Testing: N95s and gloves are available; public health working to support fit testing and training for facilities (resource limits noted).
- COVID-19: Slight early-July bump; overall well below last year's surge. Fall booster guidance pending.
- Emerging Zoonotic: New World screwworm activity at the Texas–Mexico border; federal sterile-fly release strategy discussed (situational awareness only).

C. Tobacco Use Prevention & Control (Sarah Wright)

- Grant Year: New year began July 1; continuing youth education grades 3–12 on harms of nicotine/vaping.
- Trends: Increased youth use of nicotine pouches (e.g., Zyn/VELO) with poisoning concerns.
- Cessation: Quitline outreach ongoing.
- Youth Advocacy: Will continue to support school chapters and youth leadership developed with ASAP; travel opportunities may be limited.

D. Environmental Health (Elizabeth Townsend, Environmental Health Director)

- HHS System Alignment: No new update.
- Private Well Grant:
 - o FY25 funds fully expended; final claim approved.
 - FY26 award shows a slight decrease. Policy revised to one free test per household; a second follow-up test allowed if the first is bacteria-positive (with shock chlorination covered).
 - GeoPermits application now required; scheduling occurs within the app.
 Testing day limited to Mondays.
 - Planned outreach includes ads with a QR code linking directly to the application.
- Activity to Date (CY2025): 20 well permits issued; 20 animal-bite reports received (seasonal uptick noted).
- Animal Control / Quarantine Capacity:
 - County lacks a dedicated animal control function and reliable rabies quarantine facility, complicating repeat-biter cases and municipal coordination.
 - Discussion of exploring a county dog licensing model (e.g., third-party vendor such as PetData) and establishing clearer processes for repeat offenders (up to and including dangerous/vicious determinations and potential euthanasia after due process).
 - Townsend will gather information (startup/operating costs, municipal participation options, enforcement pathways) for future consideration; supervisors' role and budget implications acknowledged.
- On-Site Wastewater / Septic: 50 septic applications YTD; 2–3 inspections/week (weather delays). Soil analyses delayed due to heat/rain.
- Ordinance Work: Update to Ordinance #250 (On-Site Wastewater) is on hold pending alignment with the Zoning Ordinance rewrite (e.g., dwelling density and current county prohibition on shared OWTS between dwellings—review and coordination needed).

New Business

A. Vaping & Smokefree Air Act – Discussion

- Background from prior meeting: interest in extending county tobacco-free protections to include vaping (e-cigarettes).
- Supervisors' concerns (as relayed):
 - Enforcement feasibility, particularly at venues like the county fairgrounds and across county properties; law-enforcement resourcing; practicality of citations.
 - o The State of Iowa has not incorporated vaping into the Smokefree Air Act, making a county-only ordinance complex to implement and defend.
- Board Discussion/Consensus:
 - Recognized health benefits of limiting vaping but acknowledged enforcement barriers and policy capacity constraints.
 - General agreement that state-level action (adding vaping to the state definition) would be the most efficient approach; local advocacy with legislators encouraged.
 - No action taken at this time; the Board may revisit if conditions change or state guidance is issued.
